MAY PROGRAM: WHERE POETRY IS HIDING

Jean Prokott, Rochester's poet laureate, has a teaching career of over 15 years. She now teaches at Century High School. She has designed original curriculum for over ten courses including Philosophy, Creative Writing, Literature, History of Film, and American Literature. Jean is the recipient of two scholarships from National Endowment for the Humanities: these are Philosophers of Education at Boston University and John Steinbeck at Stanford. She is a graduate of Minnesota State University Mankato's MFA program and has an MS in education from Winona State University.

Her poetry collection *The Second Longest Day of the Year* won the Howling Bird Press Book Prize (Howling Bird Press). She is the author of the chapbook *The Birthday Effect* (Black Sunflowers Press), is a recipient of the AWP Intro Journals Award, and of the John Calvin Rezmerski Memorial Grand Prize with the League of Minnesota Poets. She has poetry and nonfiction published in *Verse Daily, Rattle,* and *Arts & Letters,* and elsewhere.

In September we were invited to the restored historic Chateau Theater where we learned how it will serve the Rochester arts community. Our speaker in November was Catharine Richert, local MPR reporter and the daughter of one of our new members. We had a successful collaboration with the League of Women Voters for an informative discussion on low cost housing in Rochester. We heard from two teachers who offer innovative classroom experiences for their students, one at UMR and another from Folwell, recipient of the Mayor's Educational Excellence Award. We ended the year with an update on the Jeremiah program and another Rochester award winner, Jean Prokott,poet laureate.

Based on responses from the National AAUW Branch Impact Survey, our branch achieved two stars in the Five Star Recognition program in Advancement & Communications and External Relations.

Based on the nomination by Sara Staab, a Rochester high school student was awarded the Young Woman for Equity Award given by MN AAUW. Congratulations to Isha Kapoor. Read about her achievements on p. 5.

Once again we will sponsor a student leader to attend the National Conference for College Student Leaders, (NCCWSL) to be held near Washington, DC at the end of May. Hopefully, we will be able to meet UMR student Heidi Nguyen at an upcoming general meeting.

Our biggest achievement this year was the enthusiastic response to the suggestion made by Wendy Shannon and Marilyn Stewart for the Rochester branch to establish a UMR scholarship in perpetuity. In just a few months we were able to raise the funds to endow a \$25,000 scholarship for a female student at UMR. The details of the criteria for receiving this scholarship will be finalized sometime this summer by Nancy Brubaker, Lucy Bahn, and Beth Nienow meeting with Lindsey Hemker, Director of Development at UMR.


YOUNG WOMEN FOR EQUITY AWARD WINNER

ISHA KAPOOR

Isha is a student at Mayo High School where she is Co-Chair of the Mayo High School Equity Team. She is the founder of STEMGlow (Guided Learning for Girls of Color), and Founder/Chief Blogger for STEMMirror where she conducts interviews with female leaders in STEM to gain insights on barriers to pursuing STEM careers for women and to learning practical tips on seeking mentorship for students interested in STEM.

STEMGlow and STEMMirror were founded based on advocacy for young girls/women, to encourage them to pursue STEM-related passions and to showcase the obstacles that females often face in the STEM space. STEMGlow is the 1st STEM mentorship program for girls of color in Isha's school district. They provide research mentors, coach 50+ middle and elementary school students, and cover science fair participation costs for low-income students. This program was piloted at John Adams Middle School for the 2023-2024 school year.

The impact of STEMGlow and STEMMirror has been significant. In 2024, through the help of STEMGlow, around 25-30 John Adams students enrolled in the STEM mentorship program qualified for the MN State Science Fair, several of whom placed at both the regional and state science fair levels. The STEMMirror blog has over 2000 total hits, and it is presently used in schools across the state of Minnesota to educate the younger generation about existing inequities in STEM, especially across the gender divide. Isha will be presented with a certificate and a check for \$500 at the AAUW MN Meeting. Isha was nominated by Sara Staab.

Alternatively, National should send you a couple reminders (in April & May) about renewing that will have a link you can just click and then pay with a credit card.
