PROGRAM: FROM KENYA TO ROCHESTER

Growing up in rural Kenya, Joanina Gicobi was immersed in a culture of hard work and was willing to do her best to conquer any challenge that came her way. She had outstanding grades and had been admitted to a top secondary school in the country. The problem was that she couldn't afford the tuition. At that difficult time in her young life she met two of the people who would change her life by mentoring, guidance and opening doors for future education.

That resulted in Joanina coming to the U.S. for college and earning her Ph.D. In immunology at Mayo Clinic Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences in May, 2024. She is doing post doctoral research in Cancer Immunology and Immunotherapy Program.

Her resilience along the way has helped Joanina adapt to many changes. As a Ph.D. candidate, she had to adjust through the Covid-19 pandemic, and in 2022, becoming a first-time mother to her daughter, Amani.

Joanina is now focused on helping young students achieve their goals. She has mentored and supported Kenyan high school students and she has helped Rochester students as a STEM mentor. As she continues with her work as a scientist, she knows there is always a need to pay it forward.

We are entering the seasons of thanks and giving. We are thankful for the work AAUW continues to do in advancing equity for women through awarding fellowships, researching issues affecting women, and education and training on salary negotiation and STEM projects Soon you will be receiving a letter from Sara Staab, AAUW Funds Chair, asking you to contribute to AAUW. On the state level we have two opportunities to award young women whose project or activity specifically addresses equity issues of women and girls. A college winner receives \$1000 and a high school winner receives \$500. Last year a Young Women of Equity award was given to a Rochester student. Criteria for this award are: The nominee must exhibit leadership that reflects the AAUW Mission. Measurable outcomes should be identified providing evidence of the impact of the action or event. Nominations must be made by a branch member using information given by the candidate. Nominations are due in March.

I encourage you to attend our November dinner meeting to meet last year's NCCWSL student and hear about her experience attending the young women's leadership conference. We hope AAUW will continue to offer this experience to student leaders. HAPPY THANKSGIVING!

From AAUW Funds Vice-President, Sara Staab:

Look for the annual Holiday Letter from AAUW Rochester in your mailbox in early November, Last year we switched the letter to a Thanksgiving theme in order to get donations to the national office before their tax year deadline in early December.

Each year our branch is able to name people as "Named Gift Honorees." The number we can name in a year is based on the total dollar amount of donations from individuals in the branch and the branch itself. Previous honorees are listed in the back of the Rochester Yearbook/Directory.

For the last several years, AAUW National has preferred donations made to its Greatest Needs Fund so it has more flexibility in directing resources at a given moment. This year, National is allowing donations to any of the following funds to count toward the Named Gift Honorees: #9110 Greatest Needs, #4449 Economic Security Fund, #4450 Education and Training Fund, and #4452 Leadership Fund.

According to the AAUW MN Funds VP, by contributing to one of these four unrestricted ("umbrella" funds, we allow AAUW staff more flexibility in responding to needs within those areas and can still support some of our favorite causes, such as the Eleanor Roosevelt Fund, LAF case support, NCCWSL, or Start Smart.

The experience at NCCWSL empowered my identity as a woman. Even though I am at a school with women as the majority, it was still empowering to see other women in different fields from mine(healthcare) who participate in leadership. This conference allowed me to reflect on myself as a student leader at the University of Minnesota-Rochester, and not only in student government or as a teaching assistant but



also allowed me to reflect on my personal life about how I myself can be a leader or apply the skills and knowledge I gained from that conference.

I also got the chance to connect with other students like me. One I met was previously a nurse and decided that she wanted to go to law school to help patients with the law. I resonated with her deeply because I also want to make an impact using my medical/healthcare knowledge. Another is the person I roomed with and she talked about her experience in Duluth and I learned more about her culture!

What I took from this conference (it was a bit ago) was how to shape my future through side projects, I was very intrigued because I have always wanted to do something on the side, especially at a non-profit level. I also went to sessions that were empowering female voices and heard stories that I related too, some were stories of being the only English speaker in their family and having to find financial scholarships/assistance. That session I gained a lot of insight on because the speaker spoke about their experience about scholarship writing and how to make your statements essay clear. I hope to use for my following peers and I am so thankful for this opportunity given by AAUW!
